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INTRODUCTION

The Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission was statutorily created by Act 1974-120 (53 P.S. 740-749) and charged to establish the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Program. The responsibility for administration of the program was given to the Pennsylvania State Police. This was in response to a federal study urging improved standards and goals in police training. Today, every state, with the exception of Hawaii, has a similar Commission.

Commission Composition

The Commission is comprised of 20 members, most of who are appointed by the Governor to represent a variety of interests. The legally designated term of office for appointed members is three (3) years. Members serve without compensation; however, members are reimbursed expenses incurred while attending Commission meetings and in the performance of their duties. The Commission is required to meet minimally four (4) times a year and may hold special meetings called by the Chairman of the Commission or upon request of five (5) members. The Commission has created committees comprised of various Commission members that usually meet prior to each regular Commission meeting.

The Municipal Police Education and Training Law requires the Commission's composition to be:

1. The Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police, who shall serve as Chairman of the Commission.
2. The Attorney General of the Commonwealth.
3. A member of the Senate of Pennsylvania, to be appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
4. A member of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
5. The Secretary of the Department of Community and Economic Development.
6. Four (4) elected officials of the various political subdivisions of the Commonwealth, to be appointed, by the Governor; one (1) to be a borough official, one (1) a second class township official, one (1) a first class township official, and one (1) a city official.

7. The police commissioner of a city of the first class or his designee.
8. Four (4) incumbent chiefs of police from the various political subdivisions of the Commonwealth, to be appointed by the Governor; at least one (1) to be a chief of a borough police department, at least one (1) to be a chief of a city police department, and at least one(1) to be a chief of a township police department.
9. One (1) Federal Bureau of Investigation special agent-in-charge to be appointed by the Governor.
10. One (1) educator qualified in the field of law enforcement, to be appointed by the Governor.
11. One (1) member representing the public at large, to be appointed by the Governor.
12. Two (2) non-commissioned police officers to be appointed by the Governor.
13. A director of one (1) of the certified training schools to be appointed by the Governor.

Commission Staff

In 1985, MPOETC was designated as an Office within the Pennsylvania State Police and operates under the supervision of an Executive Director, who reports to the Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police.

Located at 8002 Bretz Drive, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, there are 19 staff members of the MPOETC.

The Commission and the Commission Staff each receives legal services from an assistant counsel assigned to the Pennsylvania State Police.

Commission Responsibilities

The Commission has an annual budget of approximately two (2) million dollars. The Commission uses the majority of this funding to cover personnel, general operating, curriculum development, and fixed asset expenses.

The Commission is also responsible for the certification and decertification of municipal police officers. Officers require certification by the Commission prior to enforcing the crimes code, moving violations of the vehicle code, or carrying a firearm. Certification is based on completion of the 754-hour basic training course, or a waiver of training because of completing equivalent training and passing a certification examination.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

On January 24, 2014, Act 89 of 2013 became effective allowing the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission to reimburse municipalities for a portion of Mandatory In-Service Training, and academy tuition, salary, living, and travel expenses for hired officers completing their Act 120 basic training. Upon successful completion, this Act enables the Commission to reimburse a percentage of an officer's training expense/tuition to the municipality based upon the percentage of the training that can be related to safety on public highways and bridges. This funding for reimbursements to municipalities became available July 1, 2014, and will continue each subsequent year.

²CERTIFICATION OF RAILROAD/RAILWAY/TRANSIT POLICE

The Commission certifies police officers serving in nine railroad/railway/transit police agencies. The Railroad and Street Railway Police Act Title 22, Chapter 33, §3301 (d) outlines a requirement that individuals covered under this Act demonstrate completion of a course of instruction stipulated by the act of June 18, 1974 (P.L. 359, No. 120) referred to as the Municipal Police Education and Training Law. Enforcement transferred to MPOETC in 2001 from the Pennsylvania State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigation for compliance. To enforce the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, a railroad/railway/transit police officer must first meet the standards for certification set forth in the Act 120 statute and then receive a railroad commission through the Governor's office. The following number of police officers employed by a police department in this category received certification through MPOETC and railroad commissioning from the Pennsylvania Department of State. The number reflected in the following table is incorporated into the totals stated in Table A.

¹Criteria for inclusion: If the class began during the last quarter of a previous fiscal year, April through June, with a scheduled completion date during the current fiscal year, staff included enrollment data for review.

²The number of students tested relates only to the number of pre-service students taking the certification examination within (6) six months after completing Act 120 police academy training.

³Now employed category data represents the number of pre-service students able to obtain employment by the date of testing.

Between July 1, 2013 and June 30, 2014, 1,125 students enrolled into the police academy. Eight-hundred fifty-five (855) students completed their training as pre-service students (students completing the police academy without sponsorship of a municipal police department). In order to complete the certification process, students beginning police academy training as a police officer, with a municipal police department, register automatically for the certification examination when they successfully complete mandated instructional hours and before graduation. Pre-service students have the option to test any time after graduation, or when they receive an offer of employment as a police officer with a municipal police department prior to or subsequent to graduation from the police academy.

Based on numbers presented in this report, 40% (figure rounded up) of the 855 pre-service students completed certification testing within (6) six months following graduation from the police academy.

IN-SERVICE TRAINING CURRICULUM

Legal Updates - 14-201

Three-Hour Course

This is a three-hour Mandatory In-Service Training (MIST) course. The block of training covers important legal issues affecting and are important to municipal police officers throughout the Commonwealth.

This training program covers:

- Changes and updates to the Crimes Code
- Changes and updates to the Vehicle Code
- Changes and updates to the Rules of Criminal Procedure
- Changes to other statutes related to law enforcement

This course will also examine, review, and explain significant court cases considered relevant to police officers in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The overall goal of the curriculum will be to demonstrate how these cases directly affect how police officers perform their duties. Other goals of this course are to improve officer safety, increase convictions, and reduce civil liability.

This course will also address any other unique legal issues that might develop in 2013.

Crimes against the Elderly: Transient Criminal Groups – 14-421

Three-Hour Course

Every week we see cases where senior citizens and other vulnerable people are victimized. Transient criminals who specifically target vulnerable victims commit many of these crimes. The crimes may take the form of an elderly person being “scammed” on home repairs, driveway work, or chimney repairs. Many times while the transient criminal occupies and defrauds the victim on the repairs, an unseen accomplice slips into the house and steals the victim’s jewelry and life savings. In other cases, the crime starts with a knock on the door and the victim answers to see someone who appears to be a utility worker. This “worker” may have a hard hat on, a safety vest and even some sort of ID card attached to his clothing. The worker tells the victim that he works for the water company and that there is a “leak down the street” and he needs to test his/her water to make sure it has not become contaminated. The victim allows the “worker” into the house and then follows him into the basement. Once in the basement the “worker” has the victim turning the water faucet off and on while he talks on a phone or radio. What the worker is doing is telling his accomplice that he left the door unlocked and that he has the victim occupied in the basement. The accomplice then enters and steals their valuables.

These crimes have a devastating effect on senior citizens. Some have lost their life savings in this manner and jewelry that they accumulated over a lifetime. Even more devastating than the economic loss is the loss of their sense of security. The victim no longer feels safe in his or her own home and they fear the loss of their independence. They do not understand how they could have been “so stupid” and all too often this initiates a downward spiral that ends with their demise.

This course will identify the victims and perpetrators of these crimes, how to identify and investigate these crimes, and resources that patrol officers and detectives can use in assisting their investigations.

Technology Update: Introduction to Social Media - 14-422

Three-hour Course

This 2014 course will address many of the topics that were requested in our 2012 Training Needs Survey as well as those suggested during our discussion at the MPOETC Training Committee meeting on December 5, 2012. This Technology Update will address Internet Crimes, Online Investigations for Patrol Officers, Social Networking, and Facebook and Twitter Investigations. It will look at the positive influence of using Social Networking as a law enforcement tool.

The evolution in consumer electronics has caused an exponential growth in the amount of mobile digital data storage devices such as cell phones, digital cameras, iPods, BlackBerrys, and GPS units. The intentional or inadvertent recording and storage of digital data can be the subject of forensic investigation. This course is not designed to instruct patrol officers and investigators in the recovery of such data but rather provide them with information as to what data may exist on a variety of devices and the techniques designed to preserve this information. This class will address technology, crime trends, terminology, and applicable Pennsylvania and federal statutes and cases. It will also address search and seizure issues related to the seizure of and the retrieval of information contained within these devices.

Invisible Wounds: Traumatic Brain Injury & Post- Traumatic Stress – 14-337

3-hour Elective Course

In 2012, the Pennsylvania legislature passed a law requiring the Commission, in cooperation with the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, Department of Health, and other agencies with expertise in the field of traumatic brain injury (TBI) and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), to assess the training needs of police officers in recognizing and interacting with veterans and other individuals suffering from TBI or PTSD. Legislation also stipulated that if the Commission determined that training was needed in this area, the Commission would develop a training program to be available to all police officers in Pennsylvania. This training course is the result of that legislative initiative.

This three-hour course provides instruction on the nature, prevalence, and indicators of traumatic brain injury and post-traumatic stress disorder, and offer preferred ways to respond to such individuals.



Equivalency Credit Courses

Law Enforcement Officer Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA)

13-802

The primary objective of this course is to assist law enforcement with reducing death and serious injuries by placing an emphasis on the cognitive skills required for officer survival.

Force Options Continuum Interactive Simulator (FOCIS)

13-803

This course combines classroom instruction and interactive simulator (PRISim™) to permit the student to respond to potentially deadly mistakes, indecision, sudden fear, and life or death choices. Use of force topics discussed include decision making, judgment, functioning under the effects of adrenaline and stress, tunnel vision, mental preparation and conditioning, reaction time, and cover/concealment.

RETIRED LAW ENFORCEMENT IDENTIFICATION ACT [RLEIA]

The qualification process begins when a retired law enforcement officer obtains an identification card marked retired from their respective law enforcement agency. She or he completes a Pennsylvania Retired Officer Concealed Carry Acknowledgement Form, selects a Commission approved RLEIA firearms instructor, receives classroom training in the Use of Force for civilians, and qualifies with their firearm. The retired officer takes the qualification card issued to them by the instructor to a county sheriff, submits to a background check, receives clearance, and receives the qualification card signed by the county sheriff.
