

I am pleased to present the 2008 Pennsylvania State Police Firearms Annual Report. The Firearms Division reported a significant increase in nearly every process and unit in 2008. The Pennsylvania Instant Check System (PICS) Operations Section processed a record number of background checks for firearm dealers and sheriffs. Likewise, the Firearm Records Unit reported record high figures of firearm sales and transfers.

The PICS Unit continues to see an increase in requests from law enforcement agencies with regard to returns of confiscated firearms. In 2008, there were 3,447 background checks conducted for this purpose. In addition, 322 requests were processed for Protection From Abuse related third-party safekeeping checks. These transactions, which are processed in addition to the PICS IVR checks, represent a 15 percent increase from last year.

Significant legislation affecting the Firearms Division was passed in 2008. Act 131 was signed into law on October 17, 2008, and its broad provisions affect several key sections of Pennsylvania's Uniform Firearms Act, including the following:

Act 131 amends 18 Pa. C.S. § 6109, to provide for the issuance of a Temporary Emergency License to Carry a Firearm in cases where imminent danger is proven by the applicant. Extensive documentation and additional cost must be submitted by the applicant, and a PICS approval must be obtained by the sheriff before a license will be issued.

Act 131 also amends 18 Pa. C.S. § 6111.1, by establishing a specific procedure for handling challenges to PICS denials. Challenges must now be submitted within 30 days of the date of the denial, and a final decision must be communicated to the challenger within 60 days of receipt of a challenge, to include all information which forms a basis for the decision. It is critical for PICS staff to obtain certified records of conviction and involuntary commitments and adjudications in order to meet the requirement of upholding a PICS denial within the statutory time frame.

As part of the mission of the Pennsylvania State Police to provide for the safety and well-being of the citizens of this Commonwealth, the Firearms Division continues to ensure law-abiding citizens may acquire firearms without unnecessary restrictions while keeping firearms out of the hands of prohibited individuals. It is with this in mind that I submit to you the 2008 Pennsylvania State Police Firearms Annual Report.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) conducts the instantaneous records check known as the Pennsylvania Instant Check System (PICS) promulgated by the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act (PUFA). PICS utilizes an Interactive Voice Response (IVR) component designed to handle 1.2 million calls a year and, when applicable, issues approvals without operator intervention.

Since July 1, 1998, Pennsylvania has served as a Point-of-Contact State for the National Instant Check System (NICS), operated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The PSP is required to comply with both state and federal laws in determining an individual's eligibility to acquire, transfer and/or carry firearms.

The PSP coordinates investigative efforts and networks information with the United States Department of Justice, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) to investigate and prosecute individuals who attempt to obtain firearms illegally. In 2008, 504 files were referred to PSP Troops, ATF and local police departments for investigation. Investigation referrals, including those initiated in previous years, resulted in 96 arrests, 69 reported convictions and 41 cases which were declined prosecution in 2008.

In 2008, PICS handled 619,297 transactions for sheriffs and licensed firearm dealers throughout the Commonwealth. Of these requests, 61 percent were approved within minutes by the system, while an additional 33 percent were approved during the initial call with operator assistance. Calls transferred for operator assistance generally include checks for out-of-state residents, database hits or time outs, alien requests and calls made from a rotary phone. In addition, 7,004 files that were placed in a research status were subsequently approved. Therefore, the overall approval rate of background checks that were initiated in 2008 is 95 percent.

In 2008, 10,823 background checks were initially denied through prohibitions indicated on the individual's record. The PSP received 4,302 challenges to these denials. After further review of information provided by the individual or through official court documentation, 1,623 challenges were reversed.

A total of 463,976 firearms were reported purchased or privately transferred in Pennsylvania for 2008. Licensed firearm dealers reported 208,436 handgun transactions and 255,540 long gun transactions for the year.

The *Pennsylvania Uniform Crime Report* for 2008 reported 13,814 violent crimes committed involving the use of a firearm.

There were 112 fugitives identified and apprehended as a result of instantaneous background checks in 2008. Law enforcement authorities are notified immediately when a fugitive is identified through a PICS check as attempting to purchase a firearm or obtain a license to carry a concealed firearm.

This report provides statistics and information on the activities of the PSP Firearms Division for calendar year 2008, in compliance with 18 Pa. C.S.A. § 6111.1(i) of the PUFA.

BACKGROUND

On June 13, 1995, Act 17 was signed into law. Act 17 amended Title 18 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act (PUFA). The law included provisions for the PSP to conduct firearm background checks and to collect a \$2 fee from firearm dealers for each background check processed and a \$3 fee for the sale or transfer of each taxable firearm.

PUFA and its subsequent amendments afford PSP the opportunity and ability to take an aggressive and technologically advanced approach to the firearm background check responsibility through the creation of the Pennsylvania Instant Background Check System (PICS). PICS provides instantaneous records access through a toll-free telephone number and an IVR System. The system is designed for use by county sheriffs, chiefs of police of cities of the first class and licensed firearm dealers to ascertain an individual's eligibility to acquire a license to carry a firearm or obtain a firearm through a purchase or transfer.

The development of PICS required coordination with the FBI and the NICS Program. Pennsylvania was established as a Point-of-Contact State, allowing the PICS Operations Section the responsibility to conduct background checks for all federal firearm licensees within the Commonwealth.

PICS is a database and communications network dependent system which was designed to handle 1.2 million calls a year. It relies on access to a number of databases at both the state and federal level to complete background checks. Communication problems or the inability to access any of these databases will not allow the background check to be completed. Downtime at the federal level is beyond the control of the PSP.

BACKGROUND CHECK DATABASES

The PICS background check process involves accessing both state and federal databases to determine an individual's eligibility to acquire a firearm or license to carry a firearm (for the purpose of carrying a firearm concealed on or about one's person or in a vehicle throughout the Commonwealth).

State databases searched:

- Pennsylvania Criminal History Records.
- Juvenile Records (contained within the criminal history record file).
- Mental Health File (containing 302, 303, and 304 involuntary commitment information and adjudication of incompetence).
- Pennsylvania Protection From Abuse (PFA) File (not all Pennsylvania PFA's fit the criteria for entry into the National Protection Order File).
- Pennsylvania Wanted/Missing Persons File (wanted persons for which the entering agency will <u>not</u> extradite are contained in this file only and are not in the NCIC Wanted Persons File).

As an agency organizational segment within a Point-of-Contact State, PICS conducts the check of the federal databases through the National Instant Check System (NICS).

Federal databases searched:

- Interstate Identification Index (III) which contains criminal history records submitted by states throughout the country, federal and military records.
- National Crime Information Center (NCIC) which includes information on persons subject to civil protection orders and arrest warrants (does not contain Pennsylvania temporary PFA records).
- NICS Index which includes the following:
 - Illegal/ Unlawful Alien Records.
 - Renounced Citizenship.
 - Mental Defectives/Involuntary Commitments.
 - Dishonorable Discharges from the U.S. Armed Services.
 - Unlawful Users of Controlled Substances.
 - Denied Persons File, which contains federally disqualifying records not already included in III or NCIC.

COMPREHENSIVE STATISTICS

The firearm instantaneous records check, also known as a background check, involves the comprehensive searches of many databases, including: 2,674,678 Pennsylvania criminal history and juvenile records, 504,056 mental health records, approximately 173,010 wanted persons, and federal files containing over 53.6 million criminal history records and 9.7 million records on other prohibited persons. With the large volume of records in each of the many databases searched to run a single background check, the process may require 15 days to complete when a potentially prohibited offense or condition is identified.

PICS STATISTICS

There were 619,297 background checks initiated in 2008.

- There were 377,886 calls automatically approved through the IVR computer. The remaining 241,411 were forwarded to a PICS operator for assistance.
- Of the calls forwarded to PICS operators, 201,223 were subsequently approved during the initial call.

• A total of 579,109 of incoming calls were approved on the initial call. The remaining calls were placed into research and determinations were provided within 15 days. (See Appendix A for additional information).

AVERAGE PICS BACKGROUND CHECK CALL TIME

PICS computer system statistical summaries were used to determine the average length of time taken to complete a background check call for 2008. These figures do not include calls that are placed into research for more than one day.

- Calls handled through the automated system averaged 6.07 minutes.
- Operator assisted approvals averaged 5.9 minutes.
- Operator assisted denials averaged 13.8 minutes.

CHALLENGES TO DENIALS

Upon receipt of a challenge to a denial, the transaction file is pulled and reviewed by the PICS Challenge Unit. The initial response to a challenge is mailed within five business days to the individual and includes the name and phone number of the legal assistant assigned to the file. The assigned legal assistant works to obtain information that may lead to a final decision to reverse the denial, or provides the challenger with specific information explaining the reason for denial.

- 10,823 denials were issued by PICS operators in 2008.
- 4,302 challenges to these denials were received.
- 1,559 final denials were issued.
- 1,623 denials were reversed.
- 1 case is pending final disposition.

APPEAL STATUS

A total of 54 appeals were filed with the Office of Attorney General in 2008. The following chart reflects the outcome of the remaining cases:

FIREARM SALES AND TRANSFERS FOR 2008

There were 2,367 active Pennsylvania licensed firearm dealers in 2008. Refer to Appendix D for a breakdown by county. Under the PUFA, licensed firearm dealers are required to conduct background checks on individuals attempting to acquire either a handgun or a long gun. The dealers are also required to complete and submit the *Application/Record of Sale* form promulgated by the PSP. The form is not required for the sale of long guns, although a background check is still necessary unless the long gun transfer is between two private individuals who are both Pennsylvania residents. Private transfers of long guns between two Pennsylvania residents do not have to be conducted through a licensed firearm dealer; therefore, no background check is conducted.

The Application/Record of Sale forms are submitted by the dealers with the Surcharge Remittance form to the PSP within 14 days of the transaction. Copies of the forms must be retained at the licensed business premises for a period of 20 years.

- 463,976 firearms were reported purchased/transferred in Pennsylvania in 2008.
- 208,436 handguns were reported purchased/transferred.
- 255,540 long guns were reported purchased/transferred.

CRIMES COMMITTED WITH FIREARMS IN 2008

The *Pennsylvania Uniform Crime Report* is prepared each year under separate cover by the PSP. Excerpts of summary data from the 2008 report regarding crimes involving firearms are as follows:

LICENSE TO CARRY FIREARMS/SPORTSMAN'S FIREARM PERMITS

There were a total of 150,843 Licenses to Carry Firearms issued as reported by county sheriffs' offices and chiefs of police of cities of the first class in 2008. Background checks are conducted through PICS to determine an individual's eligibility to obtain a License to Carry Firearms.

Section 6109(k) of the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act gives the Attorney General the authority to enter into reciprocity agreements with other states. These agreements provide for mutual recognition of a license or permit to carry a firearm issued by both states. The following states have entered into formal written reciprocity agreements with Pennsylvania: Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Michigan, Missouri, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming. Recognition in Pennsylvania is based on the individual's issuance of a valid license or permit by the reciprocal contracting state and not on the license holder's place of residence.

Additionally, the following states have been granted statutory reciprocity without a formal written agreement under 6106(b)(15), based on the determination of the Attorney General that the other state has granted reciprocity to Pennsylvania license holders, and that the other state's laws governing firearms are similar: Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Louisiana, Montana, North Dakota and Utah.

Pennsylvania residents may apply for a license/permit from the following states: Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts and Washington. Vermont allows possession or carrying of a concealed firearm without a license/permit.

The remaining states do not grant or recognize licenses/permits to individuals from another state, currently do not extend reciprocal privileges to Pennsylvania license holders, or have not indicated current status.

Sportsman's Firearm Permits are issued by the County Treasurer's Office and do not require a background check. In 2008, there were a total of 3,988 permits issued.

PENNSYLVANIA UNIFORM FIREARMS ACT - ENFORCEMENT

Under 18 Pa. C.S. § 6111(g)(4) of the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act, "...any person, purchaser or transferee who in connection with the purchase, delivery or transfer of a firearm under this chapter knowingly and intentionally makes any materially false oral or written statement or willfully furnishes or exhibits any false identification intended or likely to deceive the seller, licensed dealer or licensed manufacturer commits a felony of the third degree."

Before initiating investigations under this section, the following information is taken into consideration:

- Initial PICS denial determinations are not always final denials, and the denial determination, exclusively, is not the determining factor for criminal intent.
- Initial denials may be a result of research that could not be completed or additional information, e.g., fingerprints, that is required to distinguish between individuals with similar names and numeric identifiers.
- Individuals denied through PICS may challenge a denial response if they believe they have been denied in error.

In 2008, the following investigations were initiated by the PSP Firearms Division and referred to PSP Troops, local police departments, and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives:

The table below lists the cumulative totals for investigation referrals and the various outcomes. As of December 31, 2008, there were 617 investigations with no reported disposition. The breakdown of cases with no reported disposition is as follows: 1999-1, 2000-2, 2001-5, 2002-8, 2003-12, 2004-18, 2005-23, 2006-39, 2007-189 and 2008-320.

WANTED PERSONS ARRESTS

A total of 112 individuals with active warrants were apprehended in 2008. Since its inception on July 1, 1998, PICS is responsible for the apprehension of 1,137 individuals.

SYSTEM DOWNTIME

In 2008, PICS was operational 366 days, from 8:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. for a total of 5,124 hours. PICS experienced 38.3 hours or 0.75 percent of the total operational hours out of service due to technical problems. This includes periods for which PICS was partially out of service but still accepting background check calls, and those for which it was completely out of service. (See Appendix E for additional information.)

- 4 percent of downtime was due to technical difficulties with federal databases.
- 86 percent of downtime was due to PSP system problems.
- 5 percent of downtime was due to a combination of technical problems in both the state and federal systems.
- 5 percent of downtime was due to other technical difficulties.

CONCLUSION

PICS was developed in accordance with the provisions of the PUFA. PICS provides a means by which law-abiding citizens may acquire firearms without undue or unnecessary restrictions. PICS identifies individuals who are precluded by state or federal law from purchasing a firearm. PICS will not authorize the transfer of a firearm by a licensed dealer to a prohibited person. The data presented in this report indicates that PICS is working as intended.
